






Cannabis as primary drug

"All Cannabis users in outpatient treatment do have an addiction problem"


"Cannabis users in outpatient treatment only have a legal problem"



Conclusions

- » concerning frequency of consumption about 1/3 of clients with primary drug cannabis can be considered as addicted to cannabis
- » Obligations by health or justice authorities often "hit" people with minor problems – discussion: treatment as early intervention
- » Regional differences concerning the proportion of cannabis users among the clients of the drug care system might be an indicator for different cannabis policies
